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From the President's Brush:

I'm sure you've heard that there is strength in numbers. If you think about that for a minute you may consider how much more comfortable you feel in life when you think about the support you get from the "strength in numbers" that are available to you. If you have siblings from your family of origin, grandchildren, children or spouse from your immediate family, long term friends, or even recently made friends in an organization or society you know that there is indeed strength in numbers. You need not work alone.

TAG offers just that strength to all those artists who choose to join our group. Case in point is the SunDust Gallery show that just closed on May 25th. At this event, there were 25 of our members who submitted over 85 major pieces and numerous smaller items for exhibition and sale. It was a great showing of our collective strength and a great party. None of us could have pulled it off as individual artists but we presented an outstanding example of what we can do as a group.

The next opportunity to show our strength to the world of Tempe and central Arizona is the exhibition scheduled at the Peterson House in November. It is co-sponsored by TAG and the City of Tempe through the Tempe History Museum. It's a one-day outdoor event that allows our group the opportunity to show our stuff along with the city's opportunity to show off the Peterson House property. The museum staff is also looking for support from the ASU community. Talk about strength in numbers! TAG can again do for you what you can't do alone. It can get you a seat at the table on the grounds of the Peterson House with the city and the university to support you. Think November and the cooler temps. I really hope that you all see this as the great opportunity that it is and throw your weight into the effort.

Now for the Big Tamale! The Board of Directors has been discussing a project that could really get TAG some notice in Tempe and the rest of our sun soaked world here in the valley. It doesn't have a name yet, so I'll refer to it as TAG's Impressions of Tempe Art Project. The details are in the formation phase, but the idea is solid. TAG as a group, of willing members only, will join to create a body of work that represents the city and it environs, it's people, buildings, or anything else that is easily recognized as "Tempe". This body of work could then be presented for exhibition at locations around the city, used as an advertisement for our group, offered for sale on our web-site and, in general, used as a collective example of what TAG is all about; we are local artists who can do great work.

Of course, no one artist in our group will do this alone. We'll plan the project in the heat of the summer and do the artwork in the fall and winter. We can do this with as few as a dozen or so artists. But, I say, the more TAG artists who get enthusiastic about the project the more chance we have of success. We have a great collective strength. Let's show the world what we can do with it.

ART SHOWS

THE 2ND ANNUAL PETERSEN HOUSE ART SHOW "ART AT THE RED HOUSE" SATURDAY, NOVEMBER 6, 2010

This show is co-sponsored by the Tempe Artists Guild and the City of Tempe, and is open to TAG members ASU art students, and juried artists of the Arizona Art Alliance. Nearly 40 artists participated in our last show, March 21, 2009. It was estimated that 800 people attended, and several pieces of art were sold.

The house and grounds are beautiful. The house will be open for tours again this year. About 300 people toured last year during the art show.

Entry fees for participants are \$35 for TAG members and ASU Art Students, and \$45 for Arizona Art Alliance Juried Members. Prizes for best artists, will be awarded for 1st (\$300), 2nd (\$200), and 3rd (100), as determined by independent judges.

Artist of the Month Rules

At each monthly meeting, attending TAG members will individually judge and vote by written ballot for the Artist of the Month. A TAG member appointed by the President will tally the vote and announce the winner. Art submitted must be the artist's original work (based on artist's own photos or ideas). Reproductions of another artist's work, or work copied from a magazine, book, calendar, copyrighted photo, etc. DO NOT QUALIFY!

Competition runs from January through
November with Artist of the Year being chosen in
December. Once an artist has won 1st place, that
artist cannot compete again for the rest of the year.
Only TAG members can enter the competition and
vote. Members will vote for one work only, and 1st,
2nd, and 3rd place ribbons will be awarded. (In
case of a tie, a ribbon will be awarded to each artist
tied for either 1st or 2nd. In that situation, no 3rd
place ribbon will be awarded.)

At the December meeting, all 1st place winners may submit their winning artwork for Artist of the Year. If the work is no longer available, we will accept a photo of the work for the competition.

June Artist of the Month

Mona's statement on her winning painting:

"Carefully Considering" is a portrait of Monica. Her parents (my great niece and her husband) adopted her from Guatemala when she was six months old. Monica has little unique expressions that would make any artist want to reach for their paint brush.

When planning the portrait, I decided to use oils on Kitty Wallis paper and to do a vignette. That way I could focus on her facial expression and her jet black hair, in that order. This part was so much fun and things went well! My limited color palette was white, with a touch of yellow ochre, black/blue, with highlight of white, ultramarine and cerulean blue, transparent oxide red, alizarin crimson and burnt umber.

Next, I thinned three colors from my palette to prepare the spatter for the background. Then I cut a form out of heavy paper to protect the part of the painting that I didn't want covered. I gently taped the paper over the dry painting and propped it to a 55 degree angle. Using a toothbrush, I experimented on scrap paper first to practice my spattering (out of doors for messy ones like me:)). The rest went well.

When painting on Wallis paper, it is best to use a synthetic brush, to protect my hair brushes. The good part is the paper is already primed and gives a luminous quality to your painting.

I hope that you enjoyed looking at my painting half as much as I enjoyed painting it! Mona Gilstrap

COMMUNITY OUTREACH UPDATE

TAG'S ONGOING COMMUNITY OUTREACH PLAN IS HEATING UP!

TAG's Community Outreach Program continues to evolve and grow. President Frank Hebert and the TAG Board are developing a TAG project with Mesa Community College. The objective is to establish a community outreach project that will benefit second year undergraduate art students at MCC by providing funds to students to purchase art supplies for classroom activities. The plan is to implement the project in the 2010-2011 academic year. More details about the MCC project will be forthcoming in the next couple of months.

This new extension of TAG's outreach program to MCC art students is designed to help promote undergraduate art education in TAG's local area. TAG also plans to carry on the Arizona State University scholarship to a Master of Fine Arts graduate student in 2010-2011.

At TAG's June meeting, President Frank Hebert announced that another exciting new TAG outreach program starts this fall. Members will have the opportunity to participate in a TAG project involving the creation of a guild body of work focussing on Images of Tempe today. Programs, field trips and workshops in the coming year or so will help the members to create artwork reflecting the subject matter of this project: our City of Tempe as we see it in 2010-2011.
