Pamela's Statement:

I have always loved the beautiful Spanish breed of the Andalusian horses, because of their beautifully curved necks and extremely long and flowing manes. I searched the web extensively for copyright-free images to find the right inspiration, one that exudes fire and drama to bring out my own passion for horses. I had a short turnaround time because I wanted to enter it into an art exhibit and only had one week. So, I chose acrylics because they dry very quickly, yet also allow for blending, glazing and texture. To achieve the dappled gray effect on the body, I used sponging techniques with natural sea sponges. This is the first horse painting I've ever done, and what I hope to be the first of a long series of Andalusian equine paintings. It will be on exhibit/sale at the Alliance show at Skye Restaurant from Feb-July 2011.



Artist of the Month Rules

At each monthly meeting, attending TAG members will individually judge and vote by written ballot for the Artist of the Month. A TAG member appointed by the President will tally the vote and announce the winner. Art submitted must be the <u>artist's original</u> work (based on artist's own photos or ideas). Reproductions of another artist's work, or work copied from a magazine, book, calendar, copyrighted photo, etc. DO NOT QUALIFY! Competition runs from January through November with Artist of the Year being chosen in December. Once an artist has won 1st place, that artist cannot compete again for the rest of the year. Only TAG members can enter the competition and vote. Members will vote for one work only, and 1st, 2nd, and 3rd place ribbons will be awarded. (In case of a tie, a ribbon will be awarded to each artist tied for either 1st or 2nd. In that situation, no 3rd place ribbon will be awarded.) At the December meeting, all 1st place winners may submit their winning artwork for Artist of the Year. If the work is no longer available, we will accept a photo of the work for the competition.

\$1,000 TAG SCHOLARSHIP WINNER JAKE FISCHER TALKS ABOUT HIS ART

Jake Fischer, an ASU Master of Fine Arts Drawing and Painting Candidate for 2013 and winner of TAG's \$1,000 Art Scholarship for Spring 2011, spoke to the TAG membership at the February meeting. After thanking TAG



for its financial help, Jake talked about his ongoing work at the ASU Herberger Institute School of Art, showing his progress with a power point presentation. His large paintings and drawings exhibit a mastery of technique. This artist's conceptual journey is evident in pieces where the images show a scene from many vantage points, seamlessly combined to construct a new visual reality.

Jake's works are very large. He brought a part of a newly completed painting on canvas which is over 24 feet in length and depicts the changing scene at a railroad crossing over time. Refusing to

allow the viewer to passively observe his work, Jake uses multiple perspectives to engage him or her in the sensation of occupying the space and questioning

the spatial relationships.

TAG has public charity status under IRC sec 509(a)(2).

TAG SPOTLIGHT ON HEIDI MERDZINSKI

Media: Charcoal and Pastels

I was raised by many different types of Artists--painters, seamstress, and craftsmen. I learned important techniques and designs from their trades and slowly experimented to find the technique I enjoy with charcoal and pastels. Pastels on watercolor paper seem to be the best media for me to manipulate.

My father and grandparents paint with oils on canvas. They showed me that painting objects and scenes that are familiar to you will bring your ideas to the viewer.

Since I was five years old, I have been intrigued by horses. Their movements and grace are what I want to capture on paper. I find that as I learn more about myself and life, expressing what I see will always challenge me. I have always been encouraged to draw and started taking actual Art classes in High School and College.



It has been just recently that I have entered my pictures to be shown or sold. My first experience was the Arizona State Fair 2006. I entered an 11 x 14 in pastels, "Bearded Iris", and it sold.

Friends and family commission me to draw specific things for them to display in their homes and to give as gifts. I was accepted to display my work at the High Country Art Gallery (NEAFA) at 592 W.

White Mtn. Blvd, Pinetop, Arizona in the summer of 2008, and have been volunteering and showing there ever since.





ART TIP

Tipster: Danis Garman

Here is a money-saving idea to make paintable panels or canvas board:

I use the board known as "Masonite" or " hardboard. It comes in various thicknesses, but 1/4" is usually fine. The board is available at Lowe's or Home Depot in 4x8' sheets, and they are very helpful in cutting it down to whatever sizes I require.

I coat it with several thin layers of gesso applied with a white sponge roller, drying thoroughly between each coat. I usually do two thin coats of gesso on both sides. Occasionally I will apply acrylic mediums, molding paste, etc., or a thicker coat of some medium if I want more texture. On some of the smoother gessoed boards I have put a coat of alkyd over the gesso and then painted directly on the board.

Another method is to apply canvas to the panel. Put on your coats of gesso, both sides. I purchase pre-primed canvas in tablets. Cut the canvas sheet to fit the boards with about 1/8" extra on the sides. I use my kitchen snack bar as it is a good height, flat and firm. Put down a vinyl cover and lay out several pieces of the canvas. Coat a board thoroughly but smoothly with Elmer's All Purpose Glue. Stand it up at the end of the piece of canvas and bring it in a smooth motion down to cover the canvas. Turn it over and using a rolling pin, roll from the center out to smooth out any bubbles. Make sure the canvas is well adhered with no bubbles and the edges glued. Place this under a stack of books overnight to dry. Voila! A canvas panel for about a dollar or less. I use Dick Blick's brand which works well. I have never had any of these lift or peel in any way. I got a point driver at Utrecht and use that to put them into frames. Works great for me and is very economical.

In **February** fifteen of us carpooled to see the art work at the Art Expo tents. Again this gave many of us an opportunity to enjoy the work of artists from other parts of the country. We talked with several artists about doing a demo for a future TAG meeting and had some interest.

Thanks to all of you that have gone on our many field trips. Your participation is what makes our trips a success.

Our next field trip will be in **April**. A trip to the Phoenix Art Museum to see the new wing, or the Musical Instrument Museum are being considered.
