TAG CONTRIBUTES TWO THIRDS OF REVENUE TO LOCAL ART COMMUNITY!

TAG lives up to its mission to promote and advance the appreciation and practice of art, to provide art scholarships and awards and to encourage and support development and cooperation among artists.

For TAG's fiscal year ending February 28, 2011, TAG gave \$1,400 in scholarships and awards to local art students to continue their art education or purchase art supplies. \$900.00 was paid by TAG to professional artists in our community to present programs at the monthly meeting. An additional \$1,400 was paid out to local art instructors for two day workshops open to TAG members and other art group members in the Valley. TAG is also a dues paying member of the Arizona Art Alliance.

Donna's Statement:

"In preparation for TAG's 2012 calendar competition, "Images of Tempe", I've produced several pieces for entry into the contest. My usual style is more abstract in nature. I like using color or a unique viewpoint to play with familiar sights or objects. This painting was a departure for me, since I rarely do landscapes, and I used an impressionistic style. It came together quite easily, and I am pleased with the results. I may have to use this style in future work."

Artist of the Month Rules

At each monthly meeting, attending TAG members will individually judge and vote by written ballot for the Artist of the Month. A TAG member appointed by the President will tally the vote and announce the winner. Art submitted must be the artist's original work (based on artist's own photos or ideas). Reproductions of another artist's work, or work copied from a magazine, book, calendar, copyrighted photo, etc. DO NOT QUALIFY! Competition runs from January through November with Artist of the Year being chosen in December. Once an artist has won 1st place, that artist cannot compete again for the rest of the year. Only TAG members can enter the competition and vote. Members will vote for one work only, and 1st, 2nd, and 3rd place ribbons will be awarded. (In case of a tie, a ribbon will be awarded to each artist tied for either 1st or 2nd. In that situation, no 3rd place ribbon will be awarded.) At the December meeting, all 1st place winners may submit their winning artwork for Artist of the Year. If the work is no longer available, we will accept a photo of the work for the competition.

"Coconino Snow Storms"


Duane's statement about his winning painting:

Inspiration:

In the Coconino National Forest high country, even the most robust wildlife have to endure the powerful and bitter snow storms. We usually do not see and thus are unaware of the hardships that go on in this huge and remote forest. Even a mature and powerful bull elk may be challenged during the cold winter months.

I hope this landscape painting will remind the viewer of animal threats that frequently happen in the winter in the Coconino high country.

TAG PARTICIPATES IN JUDGING WINNERS OF CONGRESSIONAL ART COMPETITION

For the third consecutive year, TAG participated in the judging of the Congressional Art Competition for District 17. High school students submit two-dimensional artwork to be judged by local artists. The art is hung in the Arizona Historical Society Museum on College Ave. in Tempe.

Gail Boyd, President of TAG, was one of four judges who selected the winning artwork. The first, second and third place winning pieces are shown for a year in the Capitol Building, the

Congressman's D.C. office and the Congressman's Arizona office, respectively. The judging was on April 23rd and the awards ceremony was held on April 30th at the AHSM.

Art Tip

Tips for Pastels, "Practical Painting, A Good Work Environment"

- *Working with pastels is dusty work.. Don't blow the dust away, as you will breathe in a certain amount. Instead, take the work outside and tap to get rid of the dust. (I like to work on a towel.)
- *Don't keep any food or drink near by. Otherwise you will be eating dust!
- *Put a sheet on the floor or wash the floor frequently.
- *If pastel is the medium you work in most, consider an air filter in your studio.
- *Try working with gloves, since the pigments can be absorbed through the skin; and it's much easier to clean off the gloves than your fingers when changing colors.
- *Winsor & Newton has a helpful "Artguard Barrier Cream" you can use to protect your hands if gloves aren't your thing. I use "Gloves in a Bottle"--which makes clean-up simple.
- *When spraying your work with any fixative, make sure you are outside.
- *Keep some "Wet Ones" or "Baby Wipes" handy to clean your hands or gloves. Keep them in a plastic bag to prevent them from drying out quickly.
- *Keep your pastels in rice! Put a layer of rice in your pastel box to keep them safe and clean.
- *Create the habit of cleaning the pastel before putting them away. Use a towel or paper towel attached to your easel.
- *Working on an easel allows the dust to fall down and out of the way, rather than collecting on a flat piece of paper.
- *A paper towel tube cut in half and attached to the bottom of the easel will catch the falling dust, thus keeping it off the floor.
- *Reuse Styrofoam trays from your grocery store to keep like colors together when working.

Choosing a Paper

- *The tooth of a paper refers to how much pastel pigment the paper can "hold".
- *The texture of paper is the weave and look of the paper, as well as the feel of it when you apply the pastel.
- *Paper with limited tooth is best for light sketches, while some of the papers with ample tooth can hold several layers.
- *Everyone has their favorite paper they like to use, but to preserve your work you need to make sure you use "acid-free" paper.
- *The different types of paper may affect the look of the final product.
- *A lightly sanded paper like Art Spectrum is good for a painterly approach.
- *A velvet-like surface like La Carte holds pigment well, but you can't use any sprays or liquid.
- *Canson and Strathmore papers can be used with a small amount of water.
- *Arches cold press 300lb can take a lot of stress, rubbing, and scumbling, and still look good. Because of its shallow tooth, it can't take too many layers of pastel.
- *If you want to use liquid on your work, you will need to secure your paper to a board, like you would when doing watercolor. Tape all the edges down. The paper will ripple a little, but will flatten out upon drying.
- *Consider what you will be doing (a sketch or a "work of art"), and choose the paper that best suits your project. Consider the paper's tooth, texture, color, and archival quality.

TAG SPOTLIGHT ON DUANE SLATER

Our featured artist for the May TAGlines is **Duane Slater**.

Duane works primarily in oils; and his paintings are typically realistic, which emphasize compositions, values and painterly textures. His experience and training have been with landscapes, still life, aviation art, portraitures, and historical studies. Currently, Duane has been focusing on landscape and local wildlife art.

His art has been displayed in the annual 'Best and Brightest' juried art show at the Scottsdale Artists' School. Paintings Have been

requested and featured in charity drives such as Blue Cross-Blue Shield, Salvation Army, American Cancer Association, ATT, and other fund raisers. Duane was featured in several 'Meet the Artist' painting exhibitions at the Great Indoors stores in Scottsdale and Chandler. Several of his paintings were exhibited at the Kerr Cultural Center in Scottsdale.

Duane is a member of the Scottsdale Artists League and the Tempe Artists Guild; and participates in leading critiques for TAG. For the past six years, he has done presentations for the "Art Masterpiece Program" in the Kyrene School System. His aviation art was exhibited at the Commemorative Air Force Museum at Falcon Field in Mesa. Recently, he became a member of the Arizona Art Alliance and participates in their juried exhibits in their new gallery.

Duane was a career officer in the U.S. Army serving 2 combat tours in Vietnam. He retired in 1983 as a Lt. Colonel. After military retirement, he moved to Arizona and worked as an engineering test manager for an aerospace company.

Since 2000 Duane has devoted most of his time to painting, and has enjoyed fishing, hunting, and instilling his passion of art to his 4 grandchildren.
